



### Making it mainstream

The idea of advanced technologies being 'mainstreamed' in the mining industry has been floated a fair few times during interviews and recent events I've attended.

The common comparison used has been the smartphone, a device we never knew we needed until we had one of our own – and now many of us don't know how to navigate, communicate or access information without it.

New, innovative equipment and solutions being introduced to mining operations – whether in the form of fleet management systems or positioning technology – might initially also fall into the why-exactly-do-we-need-this category.

Hans Wahlquist, vice president of business development and strategic product management for Mobilaris Mining & Civil Engineering, told me the company's new product, Mobilaris Onboard, was at first greeted with scepticism by mine workers. The system, which can be run on a tablet or smartphone, gives mining vehicle drivers a similar overview of underground operations as the control room.

During the first trials, the operators at Boliden's Kristineberg mine in Sweden thought the tablet would be in the way and didn't see any reason for using it. However, after a couple of weeks, when Mobilaris returned for another meeting, Wahlquist claimed they'd completely changed their minds, and the drivers who didn't take part in the original tests also wanted access to one.

"If we would remove it now, it would be the same situation as removing a smartphone from your teenage daughter: you would be killed," Wahlquist joked.

At the Future of Mining EMEA conference in London, UK, in early September, Jon Wylie, president of global natural resources at consultant Proudfoot, brought up an example where workers had been introduced to a new fleet management system but decided to create their own workaround – by turning the thing off.

Wylie put this reaction down to a lack of knowledge and understanding among the mine workers – and, in particular, a lack of communication within the company about the capabilities of the new technology.

Indeed, technology adoption can be a tricky, time-intensive process, and workers in different parts of the world will react to it differently.

"[However], as more and more people in their personal lives use smartphones, miners have accordingly become more comfortable with the thought of implementing these kinds of technologies on site, as actually these people are using these kinds of technologies anyway," Rachael Bartels, senior managing director and global lead for Chemicals and Natural Resources at Accenture, told MM for this month's 'Collaboration in innovation' feature.

Nonetheless, even the successful implementation of individual machines, gadgets or wearables doesn't mean we're witnessing a real transformation. The fragmented nature of the mining industry and the siloed nature of individual operations often translate to slow adoption and a lack of standardisation.

"These technologies have to be scaled. If you're going to actually make the step change, then they need to be at every mine site, at every location; they need to be used everywhere," Bartels said.

And many industry players are in agreement with her that mining companies that take advantage of the latest technologies and scale rapidly will see "disproportionate benefits".
